Thanks to Donors, CRIS Expands Audio Service to Museums

Donors like you are making it possible for CRIS to improve the museum experience for visitors who are blind or print challenged.

Audio versions of signs displayed at museum exhibits, audio descriptions of the exhibit, and information about tactile opportunities are part of the CRISAccess[™] service.

CRISAccess integrates smartphones and QR Code technology to instantly "link and play" audio files of information posted on signs or other printed materials at museums for visitors with print challenges.

Launched in 2013 with Old Sturbridge Village, three other museums are joining the pilot, including the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History, the New England Air Museum, and Hill-Stead Museum.

Individual gifts and foundation grants, including an award from Help for the Blind of Eastern Connecticut during the past two years, are supporting

CRISAccess is based on suggestions made by a focus group of people who are blind or visually impaired convened by the Smithsonian Institution Accessibility Program, the National Center on Accessibility, and the National Park Service.

Teachers download the audio recordings onto an MP3 player to enable students with disabilities to listen or listen and follow along in the print version at home or in school.

"The best part about using an MP3 player is that there's not a stigma that makes the kids feel different. Kids don't want to be different and this is actually cool," said Meghan O'Brien, a teacher at Clover Street School in Windsor, Conn.

Brook Doyon, a special education teacher in Hartford, Conn., said CRISKids helps students better understand what they are reading. "When using the CRIS Radio, the MP3 players, they are able to understand comprehension questions at the end of a nonfiction article better than they would independently," she said.
