The Norwalk studio is located in Gate Lodge at Mathews Park. It will be the fifth regional studio for CRIS Radio, in which articles published in local newspapers and the New York Times Metro Edition will be recorded and streamed over Internet-connected devices.

State Sen. Bob Duff (D-Norwalk) applauded the opening of the CRIS Radio's Norwalk Studio. "It is exciting and wonderful news that CRIS Radio is opening its fifth regional studio right here in Norwalk," Duff said. "The services and programing produced by CRIS Radio's volunteers provide listeners with a direct link to current events, breaking news and community happenings."

#### Windsor Lions Club Sponsors CRISAccess

Thanks to the Windsor Lions Club, museum visitors with visual or other print disabilities, such as dyslexia, are able to listen to exhibit signs displayed at the Connecticut Valley Agricultural Museum at Northwest Park in Windsor.

CRISAccess links smartphones with Quick Response Code (QR) Applications to audio versions of museum signage and descriptions of the exhibits.

At a reception held at the museum in October celebrating the club's project, Jason Ellsworth, a CRIS Radio listener and a long-time volunteer, praised the Windsor Lions Club's initiative responsible for the CRISAccess installation at the museum.

Donations raised by the Windsor Lions Club funded the 17-exhibit installation at the museum.

Jason said that improving access to museums, such as the exhibits at the agricultural museum, offers people who are blind or unable to read due to other disabilities, an opportunity to enjoy the rich information on display.
