Governor may Call Special Session of the Legislature

He and His Advisers Are Now Looking Over the Present Statutes to Ascertain If They Offer Means For Making the Many Thousands of "Voters Who Will Come to the Polls Under the Woman Suffrage Amendment.

Hartford, Aug. 19 -- The legislature of the state of Connecticut may be called in session if Gov. Holcomb and his advisers believe, after a review of the present election laws that they are inadequate to give the election machinery necessary to meet the situation caused by the franchisement of over 300,000 women in this state.

That is the statement as given by Executive Secretary Buckley this morning. He said that nothing would be done in the matter of calling a special session of the legislature until after the official proclamation by Secretary of State Colby that suffrage had been ratified. That would be in

about two weeks after the Tennessee resolution has been approved by the governor of the state.

When suffrage has been proclaimed and, if it is found that the state law does not provide sufficient means for making the great crowds of voters the legislature will be called in special session.
